


2025 Season Recap


With the 2025 season at a close, it is time to recognize the season long award winners for their outstanding commitment and performance. This season featured a youth movement, as well as the return of the professionals. Some mid amateurs also finished very well on the season long points race. Amateurs, professionals, college, high school, and senior players over 50 competed for the individual tournament titles, as well as the season long awards. There were 246 players that participated in a CVGA Open Division event in 2025, with a total of 167 earning points. The average participation was just a touch over 90 players per event. 120 (NR), 104 (WR), 102 (PH), 75 (MR), 76 (LW), and 74 (TB) players participating.



Will Schlitz Bill Rolland Player of the Year **Amateur of the Year**

Will Schlitz of Eau Claire, WI was our 2025 Bill Rolland Player of the Year, and Amateur of the Year. Highlighted by his win at the Wild Ridge Open this season, Will was steady, earning points in all 5 of his events played. A near miss at the Mill Run Open almost secured an additional win in 2025, which would have been his third CVGA Open Division title. A solid player, Will never drifted too far from the lead pack in any of the events. Congratulations on a great season and best of luck this fall.

Will managed to hold off Stout Blue Devil Andrew Bauer who narrowly missed out on winning the Player of the Year award for the second straight year. This year, the difference was a single point! He was 4 for 4 earning points, with the win and a tie for fourth at the Lake Wissota Open. Great playing and a nice breakout season.

Mahtomedi, MN native and professional Josh Malnory was fourth on the season long points list, with Tyler DeBruyckere, Tanner Wisemiller, Sam McDowell, Ryan Jamieson, Ryan Vivoda, and Bennett Swavely rounding out the top ten.

Our 11th place points finisher, who flipped the script from last year to claim the Senior Player of the Year, was CVGA iron man, Matt Kamish. He claimed the tile by six points over George Smith, who clipped him last year for the same award by a single point. They say revenge is sweet and I am sure Matt agrees. I guess George would beg to differ. Matt's play was steady this season as he went 6 for 6 in points

while teeing it up in all the events this season. Matt also moonlighted over on the Senior CVGA circuit for a week, and claimed the Wild Ridge Senior Open title with a -3 under par 69. Let's see if he can take the step up now, and claim his first CVGA Open title in the next few seasons. We have 62 players over 50 that compete regularly in the Open Division.

Bryce Killoren claimed the 2025 High School Player of the Year by earning 18 points in 3 events. The Chetek-Weyerhaeuser class of 2025 graduate and New Auburn resident arrived on the scene with a bang. Best of luck as he continues his golf career.
